ENGINEERING CLASS OF '55 40th REUNION 1995



Another great get-together -- lots of I'm sorry's, but many notes on activities.

A lot more grey hairs -- we all looked very distinguished. Many nice stories, a few sad ones.

No rain this time, remember the 25th, but a few mosquitoes (a rarity for Winnipeg this year!).

Hy and Esther Dashevsky were gracious, busy hosts for the Thursday night wine and cheese party. Seventy people attended and there was room to spare. A beautiful home and two very nice people.

Professor Andy Baracos and wife Mary, Ray Chant and Reuben Bellan attended, all looking hale and hearty and really interested in the lives and achievements of the Class of '55.
